Mission and History

St. Charles Borromeo Philippine Medical Mission (SCBPMM) is an all-volunteer, 501(c)3 organization, dedicated to promoting the inherent right of the poor and underprivileged in the Philippines, to receive basic and adequate health care, food, and shelter as well as to empower them, through education and other forms of assistance, to become responsible and productive members of society. The organization was founded in 1999 as the Philippine Medical Mission (PMM), an outreach project of the Social Justice Ministry at St. Charles Borromeo Catholic Church in Arlington, VA. It was the brainchild of two dedicated Filipino American volunteers, Maricel Bretault and Celia Coronado. In 2005, PMM obtained its taxexempt 501(c)3 status and became SCBPMM.

To accomplish its mission, SCBPMM works in partnership with established non-profit organizations in the Philippines. Once a year, we invite these partners to submit proposals for funding of their poverty alleviation and medical outreach programs. During times of natural disasters and calamities in the Philippines, SCBPMM also assists well-established NGOs working for relief and rehabilitation of affected communities. SCBPMM undertakes fundraising activities to support its projects and programs.

Every November, the Board meets to decide which projects will be supported for the following year.

ABOUT OUR PARTNERS

ANAWIM LAY MISSIONS FOUNDATION (ANAWIM)

ANAWIM is a non-profit organization dedicated to giving comfort and dignity to the elderly during the advanced stages of their lives. It manages the ANAWIM Center in Montalban, Rizal, which is a home for the poor and abandoned elderly, orphans, and physically and mentally handicapped persons. The center provides shelter, food, clothing, and medical care to all residents. ANAWIM was founded in the early 1990s by Bo Sanchez.



THE ARCHBISHOP GABRIEL M. REYES MEMORIAL FOUNDATION, INC. (AGMRMFI)

AGMRMFI was founded in 1977 and is a non-stock, non-profit foundation which aims to provide development assistance in Aklan, in the Visayas. Its programs include education for poor children, feeding centers, scholarships for higher education, rural leadership development, basic health and nutrition education and services and micro-finance to indigenous industries and small businesses for family self-sufficiency. The president is Mrs. Delia Mariano and executive director is Ms. Eloize Juliet G. Victoriano.

CHILDHOPE ASIA PHILIPPINES (CHAP)

CHAP is a non-profit, non-governmental organization established to address the plight of street children in the Philippines, especially Metro Manila. It provides among others, basic education, provision of shelter, health care services including a mobile health clinic, livelihood training, and counseling support to street children. CHAP was founded in 1990. Dr. Harvey Carpio is the Executive Director.





THE FOUNDATION OF OUR LADY OF PEACE, INC. (FOLPMI)

FOLPMI is a non-stock, non-profit, non-governmental institution serving the poor in Luzon through varied but integrated programs geared towards total development of individuals, families, and communities. Its projects include a hospital for the poor, feeding centers, livelihood projects, immunization programs, shelter for female street children, and disaster/calamity relief. FOLPMI was founded in 1984 under the leadership of Sr. Eva Fidela Maamo, MD, SPC.

THE RELIGIOUS OF NOTRE DAME OF THE MISSIONS (RNDM)

RNDM is an order of religious Sisters who work with the indigenous tribe, the Dulangan Manobo, in the mountains of Cotabato, Mindanao and was founded in 1987. Their ministries include community development, basic health care services, hospitalization and medical assistance, health education, nutrition programs and provision of educational opportunities.



TULAY NG KABATAAN (TNK)

Tulay ng Kabataan is a non-profit organization based in Manila whose mission is to take care of street children without families, scavenger children working in dumpsites, children living in slum areas, and poor pregnant mothers who need prenatal healthcare. Founded in 1998 by a Jesuit priest, Fr. John Francois Thomas, TNK provides poor children shelter, health care, education, and nutrition. The goal of TNK is to give back to each child dignity and self-confidence and to help him/her reach the fullness of human vocation. The executive director is Rev. Fr. Matthieu Dauchez and the communications manager is Elise Cruse.



Cancer Warriors Foundation Inc. (CWFI)

Cancer Warriors Foundation Inc., (CWFI), Batangas was launched in Lipa City in June 2008 to assist in the treatment and care of poor and disadvantaged kids with cancer. A group of volunteers headed by Bishop Marcelino Maralit Jr., and Dr. Mayie Salvador initially spearheaded the assistance to 33 kids with cancer. The Foundation also extends educational assistance by granting scholarships for a warrior or a family member to study and develop capabilities to be able to earn a living. In 2019, as part of our 20th anniversary thanksgiving celebration, SCBPMM awarded the Celia Coronado Memorial Grant in the amount of \$20,000 to Cancer Warriors Foundation of Batangas.



Ateneo Tanging Yaman

Tanging Yaman Foundation, Inc. is a nonprofit Philippine organization, established in 1992 by Father Manuel "Manoling" Francisco, SJ. Through live liturgical musical concerts at major Philippine venues, Tanging Yaman has fundraised for multiple organizations serving the needy. At eneo Tanging Yaman also partnered with Gawad Kalinga (GK), an initiative started by Tony Meloto with the vision of a Philippines without slums. It was in 2003 when Father Bienvenido Nebres, SJ (then president of Ateneo de Manila University) launched the Ateneo GK partnership with the mission of defeating poverty.

ANAWIM LAY MISSIONS

Title of the Project: ANAWIM ELDERLY MEDICAL AND NUTRITIONAL SUPPLEMENT

Implementation Period: January to June 2021

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: US\$5,000

The SCBPMM donation supported the purchase of vitamins and maintenance medications of 68 elderly residents. Medicines provided included Atenurix for high uric acids; Rosuvastatin for cholesterol management; Gliclazide/Metformin for diabetes; Losartan/Amlodipine for high blood pressure and many more.



Excerpts from the narrative report submitted by ANAWIM:

"Anawim is fortunate to have dedicated employees who were able to adapt to the rapidly changing situations brought about by the pandemic. The caregivers perform different tasks such as feeding, morning care (grooming/bathing), monitoring vital signs, giving daily vitamins and medicines, exercises such as Zumba dance and Yoga, daily prayer, counseling, etc. At present, Anawim is experiencing so many challenges. To mention a few, elderly resident admission is suspended. There is a lot of difficulty in bringing our residents to the hospital for check-up and emergency

situations due to the danger of being infected with covid-19 virus and the lockdown. Despite these challenges, we were able to create programs that addressed the needs of the Anawim community. We strictly implemented health and safety protocols; set up triage; arranged for online consultation with our volunteer doctors; completed vaccination of all Anawim residents; held online fund-raising campaign, etc. This allowed us to continue with our commitment to help our beloved elderly lead comfortable and happy lives."



ARCHBISHOP GABRIEL M. REYES MEMORIAL FOUNDATION

Title of the Project: COVID-19 PREVENTION FOR POOR SENIOR

CITIZENS IN AKLAN

Implementation Period: January 2021 – June 2021 Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: US\$5,000

For the project year January -June 30, 2021, 80 senior citizens in the towns of Aklan (Kalibo and Numancia) were identified by the Municipal Coordinators of the Office for Senior Citizens in these towns, from among their lists of Persons with Disabilities (PWD) and abandoned poor senior citizens, to be in dire need of health assistance for the prevention of COVID-19.

Poor senior citizens, the most vulnerable population to COVID-19 infection were the focused beneficiaries of this SCBPMM-funded health project. The majority are isolated in their hard-to-reach small dwellings, with minimal or no access to government assistance for their living expenses, food, and medical needs. The national Social Pension Program supposed to benefit them with monthly subsistence allowance was temporarily stopped due to lack of government funds.

To protect them from infection of COVID-19, this project provided cash assistance through gift cards so the beneficiaries can purchase supplemental vitamins and fresh nutritious food (other than instant noodles and canned sardines) to boost their immune system. They were also provided with face masks and face shields, hand sanitizers, soap, and educational materials in English and Aklanon. Monthly distribution with one-on-one orientation was done.

In addition, beneficiary families were provided education/training on Proper Hygiene and Health Protocols for COVID-19 Prevention, backyard gardening, and spiritual enrichment. In partnership with the Municipal Agriculture Offices (MAOs) in both Kalibo and Numancia, AGMRMF promoted backyard gardening projects. A continuing outreach program of the MAOs, vegetable seeds were distributed. With the outreach support of barangay officials, some backyard vegetable gardens were planted which augmented daily food needs of the families and for a few, provided additional source of income because surplus harvests were sold.

The long period of Modified Enhanced Community Quarantine (MECQ) in Aklan had adverse effects on the economic situation of the province. Unemployment increased and prices of basic commodities drastically increased.

Delayed releases and eventually termination of social pension for poor senior citizens from Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) increased living difficulties for all senior citizens in the province. Thankfully, this modest SCBPMM project made a big difference in the lives of 80 very poor seniors and bridged their immediate need for food and personal hygiene needs.









The Mobile Health Clinic (MHC) Project was created based on the belief that health and education always go hand-in-hand. Under this project, a dedicated team composed of a medical doctor and a mobile clinic driver, together with Junior Health Workers and volunteers, visit the different areas where Childhope operates, and reaches out to children needing health services.

Consultations were a mixture of face-to-face medical check-ups and teleconsultations. Teleconsultations were carried out through phone calls and/or through video call via Messenger. If through video call, Childhope sends mobile credits to registered phone numbers of the children and youth beneficiaries so they can access the internet on their scheduled day of consultation with the medical doctor. Whenever feasible and if quarantine restrictions permit, consultations are done through the KliniKalye van.



Direct beneficiaries are the children and youth participants of the Street Education and Protection (STEP) Program. Indirect beneficiaries, on the other hand, are the family members or relatives of the beneficiaries who are also indigents.

FOUNDATION OF OUR LADY OF PEACE MISSION, INC.

Title of the Project: FOOD ASSISTANCE TO AETA COMMUNITIES in SITIO GALA, ZAMBALES DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Implementation Period: May 2021

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000

The SCBPMM grant was used by FOLPMI to distribute groceries consisting of canned goods and 25 kilos of rice each for 130 indigent Aeta families.

Implementation Period: January 1- December 31, 2021

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000

Excerpts from the report sent by RNDM:

Delesan Kailawan Center continues to collaboratively work with the Manobo Dulangan people towards sustainability and a healthy tribe. The center remains faithful in assisting the Manobo Dulangan Tribe with basic necessities with the help of friends especially SCBPMM.

Amidst the challenges of the pandemic, the center continues to accompany and capacitate (20) Community Health Workers. Delesan Kailawan staff along with a professional midwife visit and monitor the villages with the community health workers. To avoid spread of the virus, the staff who do the monitoring limit movements especially in the cities, to ensure that the villagers are safe. The

Community Health Workers (CHW) continue learning health and livelihood skills such as soap making.



RNDM provides assistance for laboratory services and emergency transportation when need arises. Villagers lately fear going to the hospital and getting covid. They come only when it is really a life and death situation. For minor illnesses, they prefer to stay at home. The CHW continues to assist patients in their villages.

The center through CHW and Staff in charge continue to provide hygiene kit materials to the villages. The CHW closely monitored nine (9) identified most vulnerable communities and updated us on local health situations. When possible, community visits were done by persons

who have not traveled outside the local vicinity.

We continue the mother and child program dispensing proper nutrition to (10) severely malnourished and vulnerable children who were required to come to the Center for their milk dispensation and whose health condition was monitored every month. We continue to encourage mothers to cultivate backyard gardens to enhance food sustainability and healthy food at home.

RNDM, with the assistance of SCBPMM, helped to provide assistance for Dulangan Manobo community as described below.

- *145 Manobo Dulangan patients were provided medical, diagnostic, hospital and transportation assistance including emergency ambulance service.
- *10 Manobo Dulangan patients were provided emergency transportation and hospitalization for major cases.
- *20 Manobo Dulangan health volunteers were provided training on health and sanitation and hand soap making.

*9 identified Manobo Dulangan communities in Senator Ninoy Aquino Municipality



who are most vulnerable are closely monitored and provided health education and awareness. This is still on-going.

*10 vulnerable and severely malnourished children are provided nutrition assistance and health monitoring and it is on-going.



The long-term goal of Delesan Kailawan health ministry, with special attention to mothers and children, through health education, is to improve attitudes towards

maternal and childcare, hygiene, nutrition, physical health of members of the tribe, and to empower them to assert their rights and dignity to change the society towards improvement of their life situation. In line with Delesan Kailawan's Vision for a healthy, self-determined and Sustainable Manobo Dulangan Tribe, staff continue to reach out to the most vulnerable members of the tribe. The Manobo Dulangan people are still one of the Indigenous groups in the Philippines that are struggling in many ways due to its minority status and different world view. In addition to their struggles is the effect of health crises due to this covid-19 pandemic. Kulaman, Senator Ninoy Aquino still numbers among the geographically Isolated and disadvantaged areas, a 3rd class municipality. Access to basic needs such as school, health centers, proper road and transportation to the market, access to potable water and electricity are still difficult in mostly Manobo Dulangan villages. At this time, due to rat infestation, most of the farmer's experience failure in their crops.

In implementing our new strategic plan, we began training a new batch of (20) CHW coming from (9) larger villages with a particular focus of the 9 identified most vulnerable villages. The training design is intensive over a three-year period and makes use of more developmental education and workshop approaches to health.

RNDM's respect for culture and trust in the gifts of the Indigenous peoples are contributing factors to the smooth implementation of the health program.



TULAY NG KABATAAN

Title of the Project: PROVIDING DAILY MEALS TO THE CHILDREN OF ST. CLARE OF ASSISSI DAY CARE CENTER (LOCATED IN MARKET SLUMS OF NAVOTAS, METRO MANILA)

Implementation Period: January to December 2021

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000



Tulay Ng Kabataan's mission is to help Manila's most unfortunate children and elderly, those living in extreme poverty in the streets and slums of the capital city of the Philippines.

TNK faces new challenges as the country and the rest of the world is affected by the Covid 19 crisis.

The lockdown and economic problems that followed made the poor in the slums even poorer as they were not able to work enough to earn a decent living. With the funding from SCBPMM, TNK provided meals, delivered food, and provided assistance to 190 indigent beneficiaries, 170 of whom were children.

ATENEO CENTER FOR EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Title of the Project: FOOD PACKS PROGRAM FOR POOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS (COMMONWEALTH HIGH SCHOOL IN QUEZON CITY)

Implementation Period: 3 February 2021 - 10 December 2021 (Note: The adjustment of dates is due to government-imposed lockdowns and community quarantine restrictions that did not allow the distribution of food packs to the beneficiaries.)

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000



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Seventy students at the Commonwealth High School in Quezon City, Metro Manila were given weekly food packs. They are among the poorest students in their school. Dates for implementation had to be changed due to government-imposed lockdowns and community quarantine restrictions that did not allow the distribution of food packs to the beneficiaries.

CANCER WARRIORS FOUNDATION, INC., BATANGAS (CWFI BATS)

Title of the Project: AYUDA SA PANDEMIC (SUSTAINING SUPPORT TREATMENT FOR 132 CHILREN WITH CANCER)

Implementation Period: January 1 to April 15, 2021

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000



One hundred thirty-two CFWI warriors (children with cancer) are presently undergoing treatment. During the pandemic, one major challenge is the loss of income of the families because of the lockdown and inability to work. Many of the one parent wage earners are daily income workers like drivers, janitors, laborers. farmers, etc. CWFI also extends assistance over and above their commitment of providing chemo medicines. There are a lot of other expenses during the chemo treatments: medical supplies, laboratory tests, blood transfusions, antibiotics, transportation costs, food allowances, etc.

The total amount of \$5,000 from SCBPMM was used for the purchase of a maintenance drug Mercaptopurine, a metabolite that prevents the fast multiplication of cells in a patient. This is a drug prescribed for all the children. Dosage depends on the kind and stage of cancer, age, and weight of each child. On the average, a warrior is prescribed an average of 12 (50 mg. tablet) tablets per week or 48 tablets per month. For 132 kids, CWFI purchases 6,336 tablets of Mercaptopurine per month. The cost of Mercaptopurine wholesale is Php 12/50 mg. tablet. For Php 76,032, we provide Mercaptopurine for one month for our 132 kinds under treatment. With the \$5,000 SCBPMM grant, equivalent to Php 245,000, CWFI was able to buy Mercaptopurine tablet supply for our 132 warriors for approximately 3.5 months.

ATENEO TANGING YAMAN

Title of the Project: SUPPORT FOR FRONTLINE WORKERS AND PROVIDING FOOD PACKETS FOR POOR FAMILIES IN QUEZON CITY

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$2,000

Tanging Yaman Foundation, headed by Fr. Manuel "Manoling" Francisco, S.J., working with the Ateneo de Manila University and the Philippine Jesuit Province organized to raise funds to support Frontline Health Workers and to provide food packs (good for one week for a family of 5) for poor families, mostly in Quezon City, the biggest city in Metro Manila with a population of 3 million and many urban poor.

The grant from SCBPMM was used to support frontline health workers with distribution of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) such as masks and medical gloves. The money was also used to provide food packets to indigent families in Quezon City.
