## Mission and History

St. Charles Borromeo Philippine Medical Mission (SCBPMM) is an all-volunteer, 501(c)3 organization, dedicated to promoting the inherent right of the poor and underprivileged in the Philippines, to receive basic and adequate health care, food and shelter, as well as to empower them, through education and other forms of assistance, and to become responsible and productive members of society. The organization was founded in 1999 as the Philippine Medical Mission (PMM), an outreach project of the Social Justice Ministry at St. Charles Borromeo Catholic Church in Arlington, VA. It was the brainchild of two dedicated Filipino American volunteers, Maricel Bretault and Celia Coronado. In 2005, PMM obtained its tax-exempt 501(c)3 status and became SCBPMM.

To accomplish its mission, SCBPMM works in partnership with established non-profit organizations in the Philippines. Once a year, we invite these organizations to submit proposals for funding their poverty alleviation and medical outreach programs. During times of natural disasters and calamities in the Philippines, SCBPMM also assists well-established NGOs working for relief and rehabilitation of affected communities. SCBPMM undertakes fundraising activities to support its projects and programs.

Every November, the Board meets to decide which projects will be supported for the following year.

### Programs supported by SCBPMM:

Health and shelter for **abandoned elderly**: ANAWIM Lay Missions Foundation – Montalban, Rizal, in Luzon.

Health and education for **street children**: Childhope Asia Philippines (CHAP) – Metro Manila, in Luzon.

Education and feeding of **poor children in the slums**: Tulay ng Kabataan (TNK) – Smokey Mountain, Metro Manila, in Luzon.

Medicines for **children with cancer**: Cancer Warriors Foundation (CWF) – Lipa City, Batangas, in Luzon.

Food assistance for **poor Aeta communities**: Foundation of our Lady of Peace Missions, Inc. (FOLPMI) – Paranaque, Metro Manila in Luzon and Sitio Gala, Zambales in Luzon.

Health assistance for **Dulangan Manobo Tribe**: Religious of Notre Dame Missions (RNDM) – Kulaman, Sultan Kudarat, Cotabato, in Mindanao.

Assistance for **poor senior citizens and children with special needs**: Archbishop Gabriel M. Reyes Memorial Foundation, Inc. (AGMRMFI) – Aklan, in the Visayas.

Relief and Rehabilitation for **poor communities after disasters (fire) and during pandemic**: Tulay ng Kabataan, Metro Manila, in Luzon.

Food assistance for **indigent families with infants and toddlers**: Ateneo Center for Educational Development (ACED) Quezon City, Metro Manila, in Luzon.

For calendar year 2024, a total of \$64,000 was distributed as grants compared to \$40,000 the previous year. Noteworthy is the assistance that provided free cataract surgeries to 24 indigent elderly patients. The result restored vision, improved mobility, return to the workplace, and reduced dependence on others. ## **ABOUT THE ORGANIZATIONS WE PARTNERED WITH IN 2024**

### **ANAWIM LAY MISSIONS FOUNDATION (ANAWIM)**

ANAWIM is a non-profit organization dedicated to giving comfort and dignity to the elderly during the advanced stages of their lives. It manages the ANAWIM Center in Montalban, Rizal, which is a home for the poor and abandoned elderly, orphans, and physically and mentally handicapped persons. The center provides shelter, food, clothing, and medical care to all residents. ANAWIM was founded in the early 1990s by Bo Sanchez.

### **THE ARCHBISHOP GABRIEL M. REYES MEMORIAL FOUNDATION, INC. (AGMRMFI)**

AGMRMFI was founded in 1977 and is a non-stock, non-profit foundation which aims to provide development assistance in Aklan, in the Visayas. Its programs include education for poor children, feeding centers, scholarships for higher education, rural leadership development, basic health and nutrition education and services and micro-finance to indigenous industries and small businesses for family self-sufficiency. The president is Dr. Griselda Quintana and executive director is Ms. Beverly Tropa.

## CHILDHOPE ASIA PHILIPPINES (CHAP)



CHAP is a non-profit, non-governmental organization established to address the plight of street children in the Philippines, especially Metro Manila. It provides, among others, basic education, provision of shelter, health care services including a mobile health clinic, livelihood training, and counseling support to street children. CHAP was founded in 1990. Dr. Harvey Carpio is the Executive Director.

## **THE FOUNDATION OF OUR LADY OF PEACE, INC. (FOLPMI)**

FOLPMI is a non-stock, non-profit, non-governmental institution serving the poor in Luzon through varied but integrated programs geared towards total development of individuals, families, and communities. Its projects include a hospital for the poor, feeding centers, livelihood projects, immunization programs, shelter for female street children, and disaster/calamity relief. FOLPMI was founded in 1984 under the leadership of Sr. Eva Fidela Maamo, MD, SPC.

## **THE RELIGIOUS OF NOTRE DAME OF THE MISSIONS (RNDM)**



RNDM is an order of religious Sisters who work with the indigenous tribe, the Dulangan Manobo, in the mountains of Cotabato, Mindanao and was founded in 1987. Their ministries include community development, basic health care services, hospitalization and medical assistance, health education, nutrition programs and provision of educational opportunities.

## **TULAY NG KABATAAN (TNK)**

Tulay ng Kabataan is a non-profit organization based in Manila whose mission is to take care of street children without families, scavenger children working in dumpsites, children living in slum areas, and poor pregnant mothers who need prenatal healthcare. Founded in 1998 by a Jesuit priest, Fr. John Francois Thomas, TNK provides poor children shelter, health care, education, and nutrition. The goal of TNK is to give back to each child dignity and self-confidence and to help him/her reach the fullness of human vocation. The executive director is Rev. Fr. Matthieu Dauchez and the communications manager is Elise Cruse.



## **Cancer Warriors Foundation Inc. (CWFI)**

Cancer Warriors Foundation Inc., (CWFI), Batangas was launched in Lipa City in June 2008 to assist in the treatment and care of poor and disadvantaged kids with cancer. A group of volunteers headed by Bishop Marcelino Maralit Jr., and Dr. Mayie Salvador initially spearheaded the assistance to 33 kids with cancer. The Foundation also extends educational assistance by granting scholarships for a warrior or a family member to study and develop capabilities to be able to earn a living. In 2019, as part of our 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary thanksgiving celebration, SCBPMM awarded the Celia Coronado Memorial Grant in the amount of \$20,000 to Cancer Warriors Foundation of Batangas.

**OUR PROGRAMS:**

**ANAWIM LAY MISSIONS**

**Title of the Project: ANAWIM ELDERLY MEDICAL AND NUTRITIONAL SUPPLEMENT**

**Implementation Period: January 2024**

**Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: US\$ 5,000**



Anawim Lay Missions Foundation successfully utilized the grant funds for their intended purpose—enhancing the nutritional and medical care of 72 elderly residents at their center. Each resident received nutritious meals, daily health monitoring, and emotional and physical support through activities such as Zumba exercises, recreational outings, and participation in farm work.

While the project served only the intended community, its success was largely due to the dedication and adaptability of Anawim’s staff. Caregivers provided essential services including feeding, medication administration, and daily health checks, all while maintaining a supportive and safe environment.

Despite the lifting of COVID-19 protocols in the Philippines, Anawim continued to enforce selective health measures, including face mask use when needed, telemedicine consultations, vaccinations (e.g., flu and pneumococcal), and strict infection control to safeguard residents’ health.

Ongoing commitment to safety and holistic care ensured the effectiveness and sustainability of the project.

## **ARCHBISHOP GABRIEL M. REYES MEMORIAL FOUNDATION**

**Title of the Project: MEDICAL ASSISTANCE FOR IN-SCHOOL INDIGENT CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL NEEDS IN AKLAN (Phase 2)**

**Implementation Period: January – December 2024**

**Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: US\$ 5,000**

### **Project Overview:**

AGMRMFI successfully implemented Phase 2 of its Medical Assistance program for indigent children with special needs, in collaboration with the Aklan Medical Society, Kalibo Integrated Special Education Center (KISEC), and MMG Hospitals. The project focused on providing medical and developmental support to children with hearing impairments and autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

## Key Accomplishments:

### 1. Hearing Aid Provision:

○Five (5) indigent schoolchildren with hearing impairments received complete sets of hearing aids.

○Beneficiaries showed significant improvement in sensory stimulation, focus, and motor skills.

○Out of 19 assessed children, ten (10) have now been fitted with hearing aids (5 in this phase), with efforts underway to support the remaining nine (9) through other funding.

○Eleven (11) children were found unsuitable for hearing aids and are being considered for alternative medical support.

### 2. Art Therapy for Children with Autism:

- Thirty (30) children with ASD enrolled at KISEC received free art materials and participated in guided art sessions (Aug–Nov 2024), funded by the Provincial Government of Aklan.
- Activities helped reduce tantrums and improved student confidence, especially with active parental involvement.

### Lessons Learned:

- The quality and cost of hearing aids vary significantly, making strategic budgeting essential.

- Strong partnerships and community volunteerism played a crucial role in the project's success.
- The emotional impact was profound—highlighted by touching moments such as a child responding to their mother's voice for the first time.



- The importance of hearing in overall well-being and the therapeutic benefits of art for children with autism were reinforced.
- There is a growing demand for continued art sessions and broader outreach for children with varying degrees of disability.
- **Conclusion:**  
AGMRMFI's 2024 initiative demonstrated meaningful progress in uplifting the lives of children with special needs through medical and developmental interventions. The foundation remains committed to expanding access and support for this underserved population in Aklan.

## **CHILDHOPE ASIA PHILIPPINES**

**Title of the Project: KLINIKALYE: MOBILE HEALTH CLINIC**

**Implementation Period: January - December 2024**

**Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$ 5,000**

The *KliniKalye: The Mobile Health Clinic Project*, spearheaded by Childhope Philippines Foundation and supported by a \$5,000 grant from St. Charles Borromeo Philippine Medical Mission, provided vital medical services to underserved street children in Manila throughout 2024. The project successfully met and exceeded its core objectives, delivering a total of **923 medical consultations** via both in-person and telemedicine platforms. Services included medical check-ups, nutritional assessments, wound care, free medicines, deworming, vitamins, and referrals to specialists when necessary.

Of these consultations, **23% (212 cases)** were preventive *Well Child* check-ups, emphasizing health education and illness prevention. Nutritional monitoring showed **74% of children had a normal BMI**, while **87% had normal height-for-age**, indicating improvements linked to the complementary *Kalyenderiya Mobile Soup Kitchen* initiative. No deaths or disabilities were reported due to treatment delays or negligence, maintaining a 100% patient safety record.



The clinic also assisted **56 beneficiaries** with more advanced needs, such as diagnostic testing, dental care, hospital referrals, and eyeglass provision. Services extended beyond street children to include their families and even Childhope staff. Support from local and international medical students and volunteers

enriched the program's reach and capacity. A new mobile clinic vehicle enhanced field operations, while a special outreach mission served an additional 100 children.

Despite challenges like weather disruptions and limited mobile connectivity, the project adapted through teleconsultations and community support. The year's key learning emphasized the critical role of consistent nutrition in preventing illness and supporting the holistic development of street children. KliniKalye continues to be a vital healthcare lifeline for Manila's most vulnerable youth.



**FOUNDATION OF OUR LADY OF PEACE MISSION, INC.**

**Title of the Project: THE SCBPMM -FOLPMI SPECIAL VISION PROJECT**

**Implementation Period: March - November 2024**

**Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$1,865**



## **I. Project Background**

The Foundation of Our Lady of Peace Mission, Inc. received an initial grant to support cataract surgeries for indigent patients. An unutilized fund of \$600 from the original grant was reallocated—with donor approval—for two additional surgeries. An additional grant of \$1,265 was later received to extend services to more patients.

## **II. Project Outcomes and Evaluation**

- 10 indigent patients received cataract surgery.

- Vision was restored, resulting in improved mobility and reduced dependence on others.
- The project successfully met its objectives. All 10 patients showed significant improvements in vision and mobility, with most regaining independence in daily movement. The Eye Center's reach and popularity have significantly expanded. Initially busy only on Mondays and Tuesdays, the Center now experiences high patient turnout throughout the week. Its growing reputation in Parañaque, Las Piñas, and Bacoor is largely due to patient referrals, skilled medical personnel, and cost-effective, accessible services. Word-of-mouth from satisfied patients has been a powerful promotional tool

### **RELIGIOUS OF NOTRE DAME MISSIONS**

**Title of the Project: HEALTH AND WELL-BEING INITIATIVES FOR THE MANOBO DULANGAN TRIBE IN THE REMOTE MUNICIPALITY OF SENATOR NINOY AQUINO (KULAMAN) SUTAN KUDARAT**

**Implementation Period: January - December 2024**

**Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$ 5,000**

The “Health and Well-being Initiatives for the Manobo Dulangan Tribe” successfully addressed the basic health and nutritional needs of the Manobo Dulangan community in Kulaman. The project exceeded its initial targets and made a meaningful impact through nutritional support, medical assistance, emergency aid, and clean water access.

A total of **182 schoolchildren** at Manobo Village Elementary School received regular nutritious lunch assistance, improving focus, attendance, and overall health. In healthcare, the project reached **220 individuals**, surpassing its target of 120, by providing consultations and essential medicines for common illnesses such as respiratory and skin infections, diarrhea, and malnutrition-related concerns. Additionally, **9 individuals** received laboratory and diagnostic assistance, and **10**

**emergency cases** were provided transportation to a better-equipped hospital, two hours away.

One of the most significant accomplishments was the installation of **four potable water systems** in Menubu communities, exceeding the initial goal of one. These water installations helped reduce the incidence of waterborne illnesses and improved daily living conditions.

The project's success can be attributed to the **strong collaboration with the Manobo Dulangan community**, built on trust and mutual respect. However, several challenges remain. Limited access to consistent medical services, ongoing food insecurity, transportation difficulties, and the need for sustainable water system maintenance continue to hinder long-term progress. The project also faces challenges in sustaining funding for continued health and infrastructure support.

While the initiative focused solely on the Kulaman Menubu community, its outcomes highlight both the impact and the pressing needs of vulnerable indigenous populations. Continued engagement and support are crucial to sustaining and expanding these gains.



## **TULAY NG KABATAAN**

**Title of the Project: PROVIDING EDUCATION, HEALTHCARE, DAILY MEALS TO THE CHILDREN OF ST. CLARE OF ASSISI DAY CARE CENTER (LOCATED IN MARKET 3, SLUMS OF FISH PORT COMPLEX, NAVOTAS, METRO MANILA)**

**Implementation Period: January - December 2024**

**Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$ 8,000**

### **I. Project Overview**

The Saint Clare of Assisi Daycare Center, located in the Market 3 slum of Navotas, Metro Manila, provided integrated support for children and families through education, healthcare, nutrition, and social services. In 2024, the center served **179 beneficiaries**, including children and adults.

### **II. Program Implementation and Impact**

#### **A. Education**

- **Pre-school Classes:** 59 children received daily instruction in small group settings (max 10 children per group).
- **Tutorials:** 16 children received additional academic support.
- **Community Training:** 60 community workers received training in education, health, and nutrition during school breaks.
- **Assessments:** Quarterly and final assessments evaluated children's progress in literacy, basic life skills, and oral/practical activities.

#### **B. Health**

- The health team included a foreign volunteer nurse, a health coordinator, and 2 community workers.

- Provided regular check-ups and coordinated treatments for common health issues (e.g., malnutrition, infections, asthma).
- Served 19 children, 2 adults, 5 elderly, 2 pregnant women, and 5 community workers
- Supported diagnostics (x-ray, ultrasound, blood tests) and follow-ups.
- Plans for 2025 include health training for community workers on key health topics.

### **C. Nutrition**

- For many children, the center provided their only meal of the day.
- Meals served:
  - Milk & Egg Supplementation : 17
  - Lunch and after noon snack : 79
- 13 new beneficiaries were added to the feeding program in October.

### **D. Social Services**

- Support provided to 7 families and 5 individual children in social case programs.
- Three new families were welcomed into the program in September.

## **III. Additional Activities**

- **Spiritual Programs:** Included Holy Week Pabasa, Stations of the Cross, and catechism led by Fr. Matthieu Dauchez.
- **Field Trip:** Offered experiential learning outside the classroom to appreciate nature and socialize with peers.

- **Christmas Celebration:** Held for 57 children with games, singing, dancing, gift exchange, and shared meals.

#### IV. Lessons Learned & Challenges

- The success of the program is rooted in the deep trust built within the community and the dedicated involvement of staff and volunteers.
- A significant challenge remains the scale of poverty, which underlines the importance of consistent, respectful, and compassionate outreach.
- The quote from Sister Emmanuelle encapsulates the foundation’s approach: *“The most compelling desire of a poor person... is to be respected.”*

#### Conclusion:

The project successfully met its objectives, providing vital services to some of Metro Manila's most vulnerable children and families. The support from SCBPMM has been instrumental in delivering these life-changing interventions, reflecting a shared commitment to improving lives and fostering hope in the face of adversity.



## **ATENELO CENTER FOR EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT**

**Title of the Project: FOOD PACKS PROGRAM FOR CHILDREN IN THE FIRST 1000 DAYS OF LIFE**

**Implementation Period: January - December 2024**

**Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$ 5,000**

The Ateneo Center for Educational Development (ACED), with support from St. Charles Borromeo Philippine Medical Mission (SCBPMM), implemented the *Food Packs Program for 40 Children in the First 1000 Days of Life* in Barangay Commonwealth, Quezon City. Running from January 10 to November 27, 2024—with a two-week extension in December—the program received a USD 5,000 grant and aimed to address food insecurity among vulnerable families.

This initiative targeted 40 families with pregnant women or young children within the crucial First 1000 Days of Life. Weekly food packs containing vegetables, root crops, fruits, and when available, other nutritious items like milk, dried fish, and pasta, were distributed over a 40-week period. In total, the program benefited around 300 individuals, including extended family members.

Among the original five pregnant beneficiaries, all gave birth to healthy infants, confirming five live births. Positive health outcomes were observed, including improved BMI and increased energy among children. Parents reported heightened awareness of nutrition, and many children began enjoying vegetables in their meals.

Educational sessions enriched the program's impact. Modules on nutrition, common illnesses, and storytelling were well-attended and appreciated. In particular, sessions such as *Guide ni Momshie sa Nutrition* and *URTI Awareness* provided practical health knowledge to mothers. Additionally, a storytelling workshop helped mothers support early literacy development.

The program also provided indirect economic support to local farmers, transport workers, and packers. Weekly food distribution ran smoothly thanks to dedicated volunteers, even during adverse weather or outside working hours.



The project highlighted key lessons: nutrition education must be continuous, and access to healthy food must be consistent. The initiative also reinforced that nutritious eating can be affordable, and community collaboration is

essential to program success. A few of the mothers also participated in the *Zero Hunger Summit* at Ateneo, extending the impact of the project beyond nutrition and into advocacy and empowerment.

## **CANCER WARRIORS FOUNDATION, INC., BATANGAS (CWFIBATS)**

**Title of the Project: PAGKAHILO AT PAGSUKA**

**Implementation Period: December 2023 to 2024**

**Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000**

### **Purpose and Use of Funds:**

The grant was fully utilized for its intended purpose of providing *Ondansetron* to pediatric cancer patients to manage adverse effects—primarily nausea and vomiting—caused by chemotherapy and radiation treatments. In 2024, a total of **229 treatment sessions** were supported, with the use of **824 vials and 219 tablets** of Ondansetron. The total cost amounted to **₱697,900 (approx. USD 12,244 at PHP 57:USD)**, which significantly exceeded the grant amount, indicating that additional funding sources were tapped to supplement the project.

### **Impact and Reach:**

The Cancer Warriors Foundation Inc. Batangas (CWFIBatangas) supports underprivileged children with cancer by providing free chemotherapy medicines. Ondansetron, although not typically included in their subsidized medicines, is essential in ensuring that patients can continue treatment without interruption due to severe side effects. The grant allowed patients who would otherwise skip sessions due to the high cost of this drug to adhere strictly to their treatment protocols. This contributed significantly to improved recovery outcomes.

### **Lessons and Ongoing Challenges:**

Timely access to Ondansetron prevented interruptions in treatment and significantly enhanced the well-being and recovery of patients. However, ongoing challenges include:

- Reduced fundraising due to the COVID-19 pandemic
- Increased number of new patients seeking assistance

- Additional treatment-related expenses (e.g., COVID testing)
- Sustained need for Ondansetron beyond the current grant scope

**Conclusion:**

The SCBPMM grant was timely and vital in supporting pediatric cancer patients' uninterrupted treatment. Continued support is crucial as the demand for comprehensive cancer care—including supportive medications like Ondansetron—continues to rise.
