SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE & PMM SUPPORT SHELTER PROJECT FOR STREETCHILDREN

The Shelter Project for Street Children was launched at St. Charles during the Sunday Masses of May 9, Mothers Day. The Shelter Project under the auspices of PMM's partner, Child Hope Asia Philippines (CHAP, <u>www.childhope.org.ph</u>) received the support of St. Charles Social Justice Committee (SJC). PMM and CHAP extend its profound thanks to St. Charles Parish for its overwhelming support and encouragement for the project.

The goal is to construct a home for the Tahanan Sta. Luisa (TSL) Crisis Intervention Center in Manila. The center provides comprehensive counseling, therapy and training to girls under 18 years of age who have suffered sexual and physical abuse. The housing and short-term support services enable the girls to "hope and strive for a new life with dignity and purpose" says Fr. Gerry Creedon.

TSL has relocated a few times over the last four years and has determined that building a permanent residence is the best way to ensure the sustainable security and healing that the girls need. The shelter will be constructed on a donated land to the Missionaries of Charity who have agreed to legally allow TSL to use it for the shelter center. It is envisioned to be a multi-use, three story building that would include an income generating facility. The 1st floor would be leased out as conference, seminar, and meeting centers to non-governmental agencies while the 2nd floor could be rented as rooms to students and young professionals on a monthly basis. The 3rd floor will be the residence of the street children.

PMM's goal is to raise \$200,000 by 2006 to cover the construction of the center. So far, PMM has secured funds of \$33,000 through donations from generous individuals and fundraising efforts. One such fund raising event was the Songs for Street Children Benefit Concert held on May 23, 2004 at Clarendon Grill in Arlington, VA. Spearheaded by Gail Goodridge, Chair of the SJC and Monica Perz-Waddington, the concert was well-attended. Performers included Fr. Gerry Creedon, Monica Perz-Waddington, Rick Their, Stan Stepnowski, Tom Bodine, Jandi Arboleda and the Onion Patch Boys. The SJC and PMM would like to thank everyone who assisted and participated in the concert. We also thank local businesses and parishioners for their donations of raffle prizes.

UPDATE: PMM-SUPPORTED FOLPM PROJECTS

PMM continues to support 6 feeding centers in the Metro Manila area. Approximately 180 malnourished children are provided with meals on a daily basis. Mothers of these children are given training on livelihood projects to supplement the meager income of the households. These livelihood activities include peanut butter making, cloth dyeing, organic vegetable farming, and soap making. The Fil-Am Association of Manassas continues to provide financial support for the needs of the emergency ward in the Our Lady of Peace Hospital, the hospital for the poor.

INTERNATIONAL MONETARY FUND (IMF) SUPPORTS PMM PARTNERS

In May 2004, the Foundation of Our Lady of Peace Mission, Inc. (FOLPMI, <u>www.folpmi.org</u>), for the third consecutive year, received a grant from the IMF through its Civic and Community Relations program.

This year, the IMF is supporting the rehabilitation of ten former street girls through formal education, skills training, counseling, tutorials, and other activities in a residential shelter called "Angel's Home".

In addition, last October 2003, PMM participated in the IMF Helping Hand Campaign and was able to receive donations from IMF staff members through payroll deductions or check donations.

UPDATE: RNDM

Sister Kathleen, project coordinator of RNDM working with the Manobo tribes in Cotabato, met with Vanette Lagera, PMM's new Project Liaison during her visit to the Philippines. She was briefed on the health care projects provided to the community and other specific concerns such as educating the people on good sanitation practices.

LOCAL STUDENTS HELP SUPPORT PMM

This year Corpus Christi 7th graders chose as their annual service project beneficiary the sisters of the Religious of Notre Dame of the Missions (RNDM, www.rndm.org). The
