Mission and History

St. Charles Borromeo Philippine Medical Mission (SCBPMM) is an all-volunteer, 501(c)3 organization, dedicated to promoting the inherent right of the poor and underprivileged in the Philippines, to receive basic and adequate health care, food and shelter as well as to empower them, through education and other forms of assistance, to become responsible and productive members of society. The organization was founded in 1999 as the Philippine Medical Mission (PMM), an outreach project of the Social Justice Ministry at St. Charles Borromeo Catholic Church in Arlington, VA. It was the brainchild of two dedicated Filipino American volunteers, Maricel Bretault and Celia Coronado. In 2005, PMM obtained its tax-exempt 501(c)3 status and became SCBPMM.

To accomplish its mission, SCBPMM works in partnership with established non-profit organizations in the Philippines. SCBPMM undertakes fundraising activities to support its partners' poverty alleviation and medical outreach projects and programs.



We have six regular partners, who submit proposals for funding every year. During times of natural disasters and calamities in the Philippines, SCBPMM also assists other well-established NGOs. At times, the SCBPMM Board also approves special funding for certain established organizations. Every November, the Board meets to

decide which projects will be supported for the following year. In the spring of 2020, when the covid-19 pandemic caused widespread illness and worldwide economic disruption, SCBPMM approved emergency funding to nine partners. SCBPMM also gave emergency assistance in 2020 to organizations providing emergency relief to victims of the Taal Volcano eruption and typhoons Rolly and Ulysses.

ABOUT OUR PARTNERS

ANAWIM LAY MISSIONS FOUNDATION (ANAWIM)

ANAWIM is a non-profit organization dedicated to giving comfort and dignity to the elderly during the advanced stages of their lives. It manages the ANAWIM Center in Montalban, Rizal, which is a home for the poor and abandoned elderly, orphans, and physically and mentally handicapped persons. The center provides shelter, food, clothing and medical care to all residents. ANAWIM was founded in the early 1990s by Bo Sanchez.



THE ARCHBISHOP GABRIEL M. REYES MEMORIAL FOUNDATION, INC. (AGMRMFI)

AGMRMFI was founded in 1977 and is a non-stock, non-profit foundation which aims to provide development assistance in Aklan, in the Visayas. Its programs include education for poor children, feeding centers, scholarships for higher education, rural leadership development, basic health and nutrition education and services and micro-finance to indigenous industries and small businesses for family self-sufficiency. The president is Mrs. Delia Mariano and executive director is Ms. Eloize Juliet G. Victoriano.



CHILDHOPE ASIA PHILIPPINES (CHAP)

CHAP is a non-profit, non-governmental organization established to address the plight of street children in the Philippines, especially Metro Manila. It provides among others, basic education, provision of shelter, health care services including a mobile health clinic, livelihood training, and counseling support to street children. CHAP was founded in 1990. Dr. Harvey Carpio is the Executive Director.



THE FOUNDATION OF OUR LADY OF PEACE, INC. (FOLPMI)

FOLPMI is a non-stock, non-profit, non-governmental institution serving the poor in Luzon through varied but integrated programs geared towards total development of individuals, families, and communities. Its projects include a hospital for the poor, feeding centers, livelihood projects, immunization programs, shelter for female street children, and disaster/calamity relief. FOLPMI was founded in 1984 under the leadership of Sr. Eva Fidela Maamo, MD, SPC.



THE RELIGIOUS OF NOTRE DAME OF THE MISSIONS (RNDM)

RNDM is an order of religious Sisters who work with the indigenous tribe, the Dulangan Manobo, in the mountains of Cotabato, Mindanao and was founded in 1987. Their ministries include community development, basic health care services, hospitalization and medical assistance, health education, nutrition programs and provision of educational opportunities.



TULAY NG KABATAAN (TNK)

Tulay ng Kabataan is a non-profit organization based in Manila whose mission is to take care of street children without families, scavenger children working in dumpsites, children living in slum areas, and poor pregnant mothers who need prenatal healthcare. Founded in 1998 by a Jesuit priest, Fr. John Francois Thomas, TNK provides poor children shelter, health care, education and nutrition. The goal of TNK is to give back to each child dignity and self-confidence and also to help him/her reach the fullness of human vocation. The executive director is Rev. Fr. Matthieu Dauchez and the communications manager is Elise Cruse.



2020 Special Partners



Cancer Warriors Foundation Inc. (CWFI)

Cancer Warriors Foundation Inc., (CWFI), Batangas was launched in Lipa City on June 2008 to assist in the treatment and care of poor and disadvantaged kids with cancer. A group of volunteers headed by Bishop Marcelino Maralit Jr., and Dr. Mayie Salvador initially spearheaded the assistance to 33 kids with cancer. The Foundation also extends educational assistance by granting scholarships for a warrior or a family member to study and develop capabilities to be able to earn a living. In 2019, as part of our 20th anniversary thanksgiving celebration, SCBPMM awarded the Celia Coronado Memorial Grant in the amount of \$20,000 to Cancer Warriors Foundation of Batangas.

St. Paul University Manila

St. Paul University Manila is a private Catholic university which was established in 1912 by the Sisters of St. Paul de Chartres of France. Under the leadership of Sr. Evangeline Anastacio, SPC started an initiative of providing personal protective equipment (PPEs) and training for nurses and other hospital employees during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Ateneo Tanging Yaman

Tanging Yaman Foundation, Inc. is a non-profit Philippine organization, established in 1992 by Father Manuel “Manoling” Francisco, SJ. Through live liturgical musical concerts at major Philippine venues, Tanging Yaman has fundraised for multiple organizations serving the needy. Ateneo Tanging Yaman also partnered with Gawad Kalinga (GK), an initiative started by Tony Meloto with the vision of a Philippines without slums. It was in 2003 when Father Bienvenido Nebres, SJ (then president of Ateneo de Manila University) launched the Ateneo GK partnership with the mission of defeating poverty.

ANAWIM LAY MISSIONS

Title of the Project: Food, Medical & Nutritional Supplement for 72 Elderly and Allowance for Caregivers

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000



The SCBPMM donation primarily went to the purchase of monthly vitamins and maintenance medicine supply of the elderly. Anawim's average expense for medical supplies range at PHP 80,000.00 per month for the Seventy two (72) elderly (53 females and 19 males) inside the shelter. Residents received vitamins and were given medications prescribed to them by their physician. Medicines provided were: Atenurix for high uric acids; Rosuvastatin for cholesterol management; Gliclazide/Metformin for diabetes; Losartan/Amlodipine for high blood pressure and many more. A portion of the donation also went to salary of twenty-two (22) caregivers for the month from May – July 2020.



ARCHBISHOP GABRIEL M. REYES MEMORIAL FOUNDATION

Title of Project: Emergency Aid Covid-19 Prevention/education for frontliners and Support for Poor Communities (especially seniors) in Aklan

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000



The St. Charles Borromeo Philippine Medical Mission (SCBPMM) of Arlington, Virginia, USA in partnership with Archbishop Gabriel M. Reyes Memorial Foundation, Inc. (AGMRMFI) provided Emergency Aid during the early weeks of the novel Corona Virus 19 (COVID 19) pandemic. Prevention education and support for poor senior citizens and frontliners were provided in two towns in the province of Aklan. This much-needed project benefited 21 frontliners (health workers) at the Dr. Rafael S. Tumbokon Memorial Hospital (DRSTMH) COVID 19 Facility Ward, the official facility for treatment of COVID 19 victims in Aklan. It also reached 250 poor and some abandoned senior citizens.

A total of 21 frontliners of DRSTMH COVID 19 Facility Ward were provided meals for 24 hours (7 health workers per shift.) These designated doctors, nurses and aids appreciated very much the inspirational gesture of solidarity provided by SCBPMM/AGMRMF. They expressed their increased resolve to continue their highly risky treatment of COVID -19 patients confined at DRSTMH under their

care. Their personal responsibility to practice meticulous personal hygiene was strengthened so they continue to protect themselves and their families from infection.

The emergency aid also benefited 250 indigent and some abandoned elderly persons in 15 barangays in the town of Kalibo; and 6 barangays in the town of Numancia. During this pandemic, senior citizens in the province of Aklan and elsewhere in the country are the most vulnerable population in terms of protection and treatment from COVID 19. They do not have financial security even for their daily nutritional needs. The Philippine government has a miniscule budget and provided token emergency aid of a grocery bag containing 1-3 kilos of rice and 3-4 cans of sardines distributed in March 2020. Since then no other emergency assistance has been provided to anyone. The meager health department budget of the Philippine national and provincial governments focused resources in helping COVID 19 patient medications and treatments. In the province of Aklan, the pandemic obliterated the economy of the island of Boracay, the major tourism income-generating source of the province; and sadly, forced closure of businesses, schools, churches, and transportation facilities all over the province. Provincial government revenues have collapsed. Life in the province has been difficult. Thus, assistance from Non-Government Organizations (NGO's like AGMRMF) and the private sectors (like SCBPMM) have brought hope and most welcome help.

Each of the 250 indigent and abandoned senior citizen project beneficiary was given a gift check for personal purchase of basic food items like milk, sugar, bread, canned meat/fish, and personal hygiene items like face masks, alcohol, bath soap, laundry soap, etc. The distribution of gift checks and Information Education Communication (IEC) materials were closely coordinated with the Local Chief Executives of the 2 municipalities: Kalibo and Numancia. Criteria for the selection of beneficiaries were discussed with Municipal Office for Senior Citizens Assistance Coordinators and the mayors for proper implementation of the project.

CHILDHOPE ASIA PHILIPPINES

Title of the Project: Mobile Health Clinic

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000



The Mobile Health Clinic (MHC) Project was created based on the belief that health and education always go hand-in-hand. Under this project, a dedicated team composed of a medical doctor and a mobile clinic driver, together with Junior Health Workers and volunteers, visit the different areas where Childhope operates, and reaches out to children needing health services. The Mobile Health Clinic van itself is complete with the necessary medicines and supplements, supplies, and equipment needed to address common health problems.



In 2020, a total of 300 families or 500 beneficiaries received Childhope COVID-19 Care Kits. The kits included:

1. Washable/Reusable cotton face masks
2. Soap for bathing and handwashing
3. Disinfectant (bleach) with instructions for mixing and usage
4. 70% alcohol
5. Multivitamin and Mineral supplements (mostly Vitamin C + Zinc)
6. COVID19 information pamphlet (graphic in Filipino, for better comprehension)



7. These kits were distributed along with packs of relief goods comprised mostly of food items.



FOUNDATION OF OUR LADY OF PEACE MISSION, INC.

Title of the Project: Food, Lodging, Transportation and Cash Assistance to Healthcare workers in Various Hospitals

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000

The SCBPMM grant was used by FOLPMI to provide living quarters, food, transportation and cash assistance to health care workers of the hospital and nearby hospitals.

RELIGIOUS OF NOTRE DAME MISSIONS

Title of the Project: Emergency Relief Assistance for 60 Manobo Dulangan Girls, 20 Community Health Workers, 20 Women Bead Workers and 10 Malnourished Children in the Remote Municipality of Senator Ninoy Aquino (Kulaman), Sultan Kudarat

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000

In collaboration with St. Charles Borromeo Philippine Medical Mission and in coordination with the Local Government Unit-Quick Response team, the Oblates of Mary Immaculate (OMI), and SNAVODA transport, RNDM distributed relief

goods and medicines to 132 households living in the far flung villages of Bugso, Kadi, Malegdeg, Kiadsam, Nati, Kuden, Midtungok and Buenaflores on April 27-29, 2020 . These were received with great joy. Emergency Relief Assistance was distributed to the families of 60 Delesan Kailawan Girls, 34 community health workers, 23 women bead workers and 10 malnourished children in the remote municipality of Senator Ninoy Aquino (Kulaman), Sultan Kudarat.



The SCBPMM grant was used to provide relief assistance. Beneficiaries were provided rice, noodles, sardines, sugar, salt, paracetamol, multivitamins, milk, and bathing and washing soap, to sustain them through the quarantine period, which prevented the families from earning enough to meet their basic needs.



TULAY NG KABATAAN

Title of the Project: Providing Food for Center's Children and Street Children during 2020 lockdown

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000



Tulay Ng Kabataan's mission is to help Manila's most unfortunate children and elderly: those living in extreme poverty in the streets and slums of the capital city of the Philippines.

TNK faces new challenges as the country and the rest of the world is affected by the Covid 19 crisis.

TNK reported no Covid cases among their staff or beneficiaries. The situation is getting worse, though, day after day as the lockdown impacts daily life and the ability to work. The poor in the slums live paycheck to paycheck and are not able to work enough to earn a decent living during this time. TNK delivers food and provides assistance to as many as 600 indigent beneficiaries and provides education to about 370 street children. TNK spends about Php 900,000 on its feeding program. Emergency grant from St. Charles Borromeo Philippine Medical Mission helped TNK provide food for its beneficiaries during the Covid lockdown.

2020 SPECIAL PARTNERS

CANCER WARRIORS FOUNDATION, INC., BATANGAS (CWFI BATS)

Title of the Project: Ayuda sa Pandemic/ Help During Pandemic (Sustaining support treatment for 132 children with cancer)

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$5,000

One hundred twenty three (123) CWFI warriors (children with cancer) are presently undergoing treatment. The priority focus of the Foundation is on the initial treatment of patients during the first 6-8 months. Chemotherapy is administered 1 to 2 times a week during this time. Maintenance phase of 24 to 36 month follows. Chemotherapy during this time is once a month until the child “graduates” from treatment. SCBMM has previously assisted with half of the expenses for the maintenance medications for 63 warriors from the provinces of Batangas, Cavite, Quezon, Laguna, Mindoro Oriental, Mindoro Occidental and Marinduque. The SCBPMM Celia Coronado Memorial Grant was awarded to CWFI in 2019 was also used to provide laptops to assist in the online schooling of children with cancer.

During the Covid 19 pandemic, one major challenge is the loss of income of the families because of the lockdown and inability to work. Many of the one parent wage earners are daily income workers like tricycle or jeepney drivers, janitors, laborers, farmers, etc. Now CWFI also has to extend assistance over and above their commitment of providing chemo medicines. There are a lot of other expenses during the chemo treatments: medical supplies, laboratory tests, blood transfusions, antibiotics, transportation costs, food allowances, etc.

Tanging Yaman Foundation, headed by Fr. Manuel “Manoling” Francisco, S.J., working with the Ateneo de Manila University and the Philippine Jesuit Province organized to raise funds to support Frontline Health Workers and to provide food packs (good for one week for a family of 5) for poor families, mostly in Quezon City, the biggest city in Metro Manila with a population of 3 million and many urban poor.

In addition to canned goods and other processed food, vegetables from farmers in Benguet and Nueva Ecija and also dried fish from Cebu were also given. This also provides income for farmers and fishermen, who are also suffering from lack of buyers.

ST. PAUL UNIVERSITY

Title of the Project: Capacity Building for Nurses and Healthcare Workers in the Community and Local Hospitals in Metro Manila: Caring for the Covid-19 Patient from Prevention to Recuperation.

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$3,000

In the early months of the pandemic, St. Paul University started an initiative to help address this problem by providing education to nurses and other healthcare workers. Education was given to prevent transmission and care for those infected.

1. Discuss proper ways of preventing COVID 19 transmission, specifically:
 1. Handwashing
 2. Putting, keeping and disposing of face masks and gloves
 3. Social distancing
2. Enumerate the correct steps in taking temperature through a thermal scanner
3. Demonstrate in proper order the following procedures:
 1. Handwashing
 2. Putting and disposing of face masks and gloves
 3. Taking temperature through a thermal scanner
4. Show ways on how to apply the screening guidelines in detecting a possible COVID 19 patient in their community/hospital.
5. Identify immediate care protocols to a patient with mild COVID 19 symptoms.
6. Demonstrate correct health teaching approaches.
7. Recommend at least one activity that will allow the patient/community dweller to transition back to the community after COVID 19 infection.
8. Educate the clients/community dwellers in their work/home place with focus on prevention and recuperation.

Participants: Nurses and other healthcare workers from Our Lady of Peace Hospital, St. Paul Hospital City, Paranaque Community Hospital and White Cross Orphanage. Barangay Health Workers and families from nearby communities and welfare institutions in Manila.

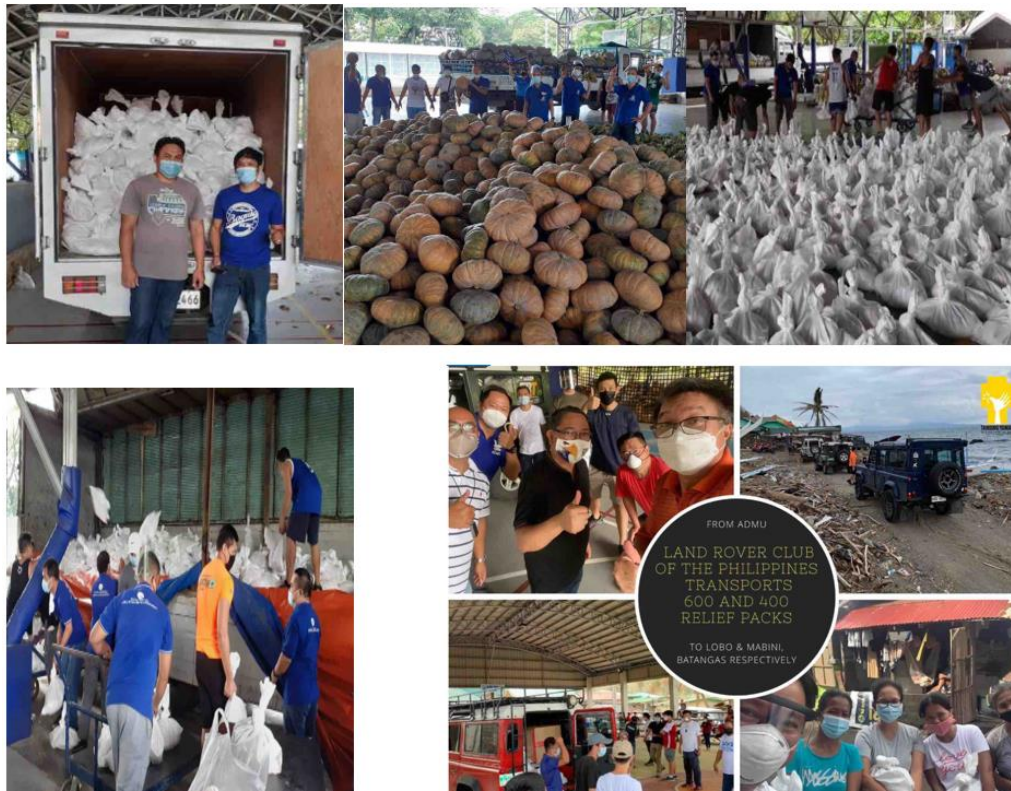

Tanging Yaman Foundation has been at the forefront of providing relief to indigent families affected by the Pandemic of Covid-19. It also provided relief for families affected by Typhoons Rolly and Ulysses in Bicol, Marikina and Cagayan Valley. CANCER WARRIORS FOUNDATION

Title of the Project: Emergency relief for victims of Taal Volcano eruption

Grant given by SCBPMM for this project: \$ 1,000



On January 12, 2020, Taal volcano in Batangas, Philippines erupted, causing the death of 39 people. There was massive upheaval and huge economic losses estimated at Php 6.658 billion. SCBPMM sent emergency grant to CWF as families of 57 cancer warriors were living in the 17 kilometer radius of the Taal Volcano. Many of the families were evacuated from their homes including a family from the Volcano island itself and others within a 7 kilometer radius.

SCBPMM EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

Christmas Campaign 2020
